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HPSUT Historian Visits 4th Graders at Upper Twp. Elementary School

On May 8th of this year, I had the privilege of going to the Upper Township Elementary School (UTES) and speaking to our wonderful (and large -seven classes!) fourth grade class. Instead of speaking to the entire group at once, the teachers wisely broke them, up into three groups; Two groups of two classes each and one group of three classes.

Since it would be my only visit of the school year for this fourth grade class, I focused on the theme: The History of Upper Township in pictures and objects.

This visit was planned over the winter with the principal of the school, Mrs. Andrea Urbana, who was both excited by the proposal

Artifacts from the Willets – Williams historic site in the Village of Tuckahoe have been delivered to Upper Township by the New Jersey Dept. of Transportation NJDOT and are currently on display at the Upper Cape Branch Library in Petersburg.

According to the information brochure prepared by the firm NV5, in conjunction with the DOT, the Willets-Williams site was one of two where test excavations were done in conjunction with the

The test work at the sites revealed native American precontact sites, dating back

It seems as if we are as close as we've ever been to realizing that we will one day soon have our very own historical museum. It's very exciting but also a time filled with challenges. I'm sure many of you have heard me say that we are one of only a handful of municipalities within a 50-mile radius that does NOT currently have a museum. A township of this size and prestige needs a museum and has needed one for years! The HPSUT has enormous amounts of items which can be displayed for both the pleasure and education of its citizens. Upper Township History Book Completed, Set for Release in Feb. 2020

The Arcadia Publishing Company Book -Upper Township and Its Ten Villages written by our Historian Robert F. Holden is due to be published in February, 2020. The journey was an arduous one, but filled with great interactions with so many won-

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derful residents of the township who gladly shared their photos but also their families' histories. (Holden was like the old TV character Paladin with his Have Scanner, Will Travel motto.) Holden collected well over 300 photos and postcards of old Upper Township (Many were 100 years old or more!) and the job of editing them down to a workable number was daunting.

What to leave in and what to take out was extremely difficult because all the pictures were so fascinating. Some Villages like Greenfield had only 4 pictures total, and Seaville had nearly 60 (which was ject. eventually edited down to 36) and Tuckahoe had almost 100 (and this total was gleaned down to 56!)

Could there be a subsequent Volume 2 down the line? We'll see, said Holden. 'The publisher restricts authors to about 225 pictures at maximum, (total word count is variable, but our book is at about possible! 27,000 words) and Mr. Holden cut it at 197 because of the fact that each chapter Its Ten Villages come this January, 2020. (One per village) has a two-page introduction. There will be 129 pages complete with a Dedication, Acknowledgements, Table of Contents and a Bibliog-

Mr. Holden started the book this winter with the full support of the Historical Society and it was this winter that the Board agreed to pay for the down payment for initiating the contract with Arcadia.

The company's contract gives the Historical Society about 48% of the profits from the book.

Mr. Holden is taking no profits from the sale of the books (The initial purchase is 500 copies) but rather is turning this money towards the HPSUT museum pro-

and anxious for the kids to learn a bit more about Upper Township. The teachers were most welcoming and enthusiastic and had the children highly motivated by the visit. (One of teachers, Mrs. Klein was the mother of a student I taught many years ago in my gifted/ talented program in Ocean City; Chris Transue. It was a happy time to see her again, reminisce and find out about Chris.)

The students were wonderful and showed a great deal of enthusiasm with lots of questions.

I first showed them items that Carol Williams had gathered together some years ago for a proposed "What's in the Trunk?" presentation.

I took the "What's this Object" direction and the kids had a great time guessing. Items like; the curry comb, wooden sock darner, butter press, nutmeg grater, and the new addition of the early 18th century coins (donated by John Yank who found on his property) brought smiles to the students' faces. Some of the guesses for the curry comb were hilarious.

I also brought early 19th century school books from our HPSUT collection and handled with cloth gloves, explain why! Very official! The students were fascinated by the reading and math questions in the book and I read out some old math problems for them to solve.

What was most fun, however, was showing the students some of the photographs of the township (which the teachers were able to bring up from my thumb drive onto the class smart board-Technology!) I have been collecting for the book, *Upper Township and Its Ten Villages* (due to be published in Jan. 2020) I told the teachers that the fourth-grade class would receive a book when it came out.

Most of the students knew what village they lived in, but some did not, so this was especially educational for them. I think it is very important for each student to know exactly what village of the township they live in and so I reviewed each one for a show of hands of who lived where. (One young man thought he lived in Somers Point, but then remembered that he had moved!) In the fall, I will be bringing the new fourth grade group copies of maps of the township.

Seeing buildings that are now changed into something else entirely (either torn down completely or a new business in its place) gave some of the students' pause.

To grasp that the entire *Wayside Village* was once a huge farm, really surprised them all! Telling them that the *ice cream tower* out front was once the water pump for the farm, really shocked them. (There's another farm building still there as well out on the parking lot that, I think is now a pet care shop.)

The students were fascinated by the age of some of the photos. Most of the kids were happy when a photo came up and I was able to tell them what's there now.

For example, an old photo of *Hagelgans' Store*, (later, *Ann Porter's Store*) on Main Street in Tuckahoe, taken in 1938, created a loud gasp when I told them that it was the Tuckahoe Bike Shop. I showed them a 1940 photo of the Collins General Store and Amoco station and told them that it was now Kirk's Pizza. It was great fun to see their reactions.



What amazed them the most, however, were the photos of the various school classes going as far back to the year 1899. Kids have little sense of real time at that age, so telling them the kids were as old as their great-grandparents was shocking to most of them.

The students loved looking at what the kids wore, and I pointed out one class photo showing a little boy with no shoes at all and many were saddened by the fact. (As educators, we need to teach empathy as well the facts!)

It was wonderful to be back in an elementary classroom again. (after a 41-year teaching career) and I think the children had a great time in the limited amount of time I had with them. (45 minutes per group)

The principal informed me that the teachers loved the presentation and want me to come back next year, which I had already proposed.

I will be back in the fall with their new crop of fourth graders. The plan now is to visit their classrooms (with groups brought together as this year) every other month (at least) to talk predominantly about NJ History focusing on Upper Township. There is no doubt in my mind that this will stimulate the children to be more interested in history and will hopefully also encourage their parents to support and even join the HPSUT. (as well as support our museum when it comes!)

I had planned to bring handouts to share with the students, but I mailed them to the principal in advance (one story was about the Tuckahoe bank Robbery) and she scanned them and emailed them home to every child's parents! Wonderful! The parents can read them together with their fourth grader. Technology! Wonderful! - reset type size for final version

As the current Historian for the HPSUT, I am committed to this fourth-grade classroom project and I'm looking forward to starting again this fall with a whole new fourth grade class.

The opening subjects will be the Leni Lenape Indians who lived in our area, followed by its early settlers.

Perhaps some readers do not know that Nj History is mandated by the State of New Jersey. I know the curriculum well after having been a fourth-grade teacher for most of my school career; both in the self-contained classroom as well as the gifted -talented classroom.



HPSUT's Museum Committee Report for August 2019

The HPSUT Museum Committee met on Monday July 22nd with architect Chris Menchin to review the budget as presented to us for the first time. The members of this important committee are: Carol Williams, Doug Longenecker, Mike Houdart, Sonia Forry, Jerry Bailey and Ralph Cooper. From the Township, members are: Paul Dietrrich and Hobie Young.

While a few members were not in attendance that day, "the show had to go on" with Chris Menchin revealing what the General Contractor, Tri-Mark developed as to the overall cost of the project.

This figure will be revealed at a later time. Why? We feel it is important to keep this figure guarded until it is reviewed by the Upper Twp. Committee and we meet with the Cape May County Open Space Committee requesting funds for this Parks and Recreation project. I'm sure that everyone will understand, but suffice it to say that the figure is over one million dollars.

Keep in mind that this building is a complete renovation, top to bottom, stem to stern. It needs to be stripped to the bare walls and start with insulation, then plywood, then sheet rock, new ceilings, flooring (diverse in multiple settings inside; i.e. carpet, manufactured flooring etc.) new double pane thermal windows throughout, new wiring, a completely new and efficient HVAC, water systems, bathrooms, fixtures, lighting, exterior brick work, then final painting with protective rubberized paint, an outside entry/exit ramp for handicapped access, landscaping and a new surface for the parking lot, etc. etc.

The plan at this writing is for the township committee to sign the copies of the grant and then pass them back to us. The next deadline for submission of projects to the Open Space Committee is August 15th and then again after that, December 16th. We hope to make the August deadline, but then anything can happen. If it must be December we are prepared.

If anyone has any questions about the plans or preliminary costs, please contact me at holdenon@comcast.net. We have copies of the "blueprints" and detailed plans with pictures for proposed surfaces, fixtures, etc. which can be viewed.

Thanks very much for your support! I'm willing to talk to anyone who wants to help us as we proceed with this important and necessary project for our community!

In the near future we will be asking our

membership to step up and help out by being a member of our Museum Support Group -Friends of the Upper Township Museum. This will involve fundraising, do-

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the study area.

The project handout denotes that the NNDOT sponsored additional excavations by NV5 at these sites, followed by laboratory analysis and research. The recovered artifacts, along with wills, deeds, maps and existing local accounts, helped bring life to stories about Tuckahoe's early inhabitants. The site locations are the Willets-Williams, at the intersection of

Route 50 and Route 49 in Tuckahoe and the Mosquito Landing road site.

According to the NJDOT handout, each location yielded information about the early history of the area through the analysis of artifacts, soil features and landscapes. The resulting collections and the technical reports will be made available for research at the Historical Preservation Society of Upper Township. ##


