BAKERS NEEDED DESPERATELY!

Each year our best money maker is strawberry bread. People come before we open and buy 5 or 6 loaves. Please, please bake for us. You can bake ahead and freeze the loaves. Just call Ebbie Unsworth @ 390-7443 for the pans. The recipe is as follows:

STRAWBERRY BREAD

Makes three 8 inch x 4 inch loaves:

2 (10 ounce) packages frozen strawberries thawed
4 eggs
1 ¼ cup salad oil
3 cups flour
2 cups sugar
3 teaspoons cinnamon
1 teaspoon baking soda
1 teaspoon salt
1 cup chopped nuts (optional)



Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease and flour three 8x4 loaf pans. In a bowl combine strawberries, eggs and oil. In a separate bowl combine flour, sugar, cinnamon, baking soda, and nuts. Add strawberry mixture to dry ingredients and stir until blended. Pour batter into pans. Bake 1 hour or until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Keep the loaves in the pans, wrap them, and bring them to the Gandy Farmstead on June 2.
