



APPLE LOAF

From the kitchen of Olive Pisani

Serves 12 Preheat oven to 350.

Ingredients:

1/3 cups butter or margarine

2/3 cups sugar

2 tsp. grated lemon peel

1/4 tsp. cinnamon

2 eggs

3 tbsp. milk

1 tsp. lemon juice

2 tsp. vanilla

2 cups flour

1 tsp. baking powder

½ tsp. baking soda

2.5 cups peeled shredded apples ½ cup chopped nuts (optional)

Cream together the butter, sugar, lemon peel and cinnamon. Beat in eggs until light and fluffy. Beat in lemon juice and milk. Stir together dry ingredients; add to creamed mixture, stirring until moistened. Fold in apples and nuts.

Pour into 2 greased 5x9 loaf pans

Pour into 2 greased 5x9 loaf pans and bake for 1 hour.

Bring to the AppleFest 1 hour ahead for sale by the society.



IN MEMORY Lewis P. Albrecht, Jr. 1926 - 2014



Since the founding of the Historical Society, Lew Albrecht has played a major role in developing our historical sites. He was instrumental in restoring the historic Gandy Farmstead on Tyler Road. He guided the development of the farmstead and he moved the historic 1812 Townsend Stites barn in Beesley's Point to the property. He added a root cellar, smoke house, privy and a windmill making the property a showcase for sustainability.

Lew Albrecht also was responsible for the declaration of the Historic District in Marshallville. He worked long and hard to complete the paperwork necessary for that notable distinction.

A World War II veteran, Lew served on the infamous naval ship, the Franklin. After a Kamikaze attack, he was trapped in smoke and fire on the third deck below. Through some heroic actions, he made it to safety and survived to return to his Cape May County home.

Lewis P. Albrecht, Jr., age 88, of Ocean View, NJ, died on Thursday, July 9, 2014. He is survived by his wife, Jean M. and his son, Lewis P. III.

OUR DEAR FRIEND, MAY HE REST IN PEACE



A story about Lew Albrect:


In early 1945 Lew was assigned to the USS Franklin (CV-13) aircraft carrier which had been recently repaired after being badly damaged in combat operations in the Philippines. On March 19, 1945, Franklin was operating near the island of Honshu conducting air strikes against the Japanese homeland. Suddenly a single Japanese plane attacked the Franklin causing severe damage and igniting fires throughout the second and third decks in the area where Lew's duty station was located. Over 300 men were trapped in total darkness and there was no way to escape. Lt. Donald Gary who discovered the men (Lew was one of them.), found an exit from the compartment and repeatedly led groups to safety.

Lt. Gary was subsequently awarded the Medal of Honor for his heroic actions that day. I believe Lew met Lt. Gary years later.

Casualties on Franklin totaled 724 killed and 265 wounded. The ship returned to Pearl Harbor for a clean-up and repairs and then sailed to Brooklyn, NY, arriving on 28 April. (I don't know when Lew was re-assigned and/or discharged from the Navy)
