





This corduroy road was visible during last summer's drought. The picture was taken from the gravel road around the impoundments in the Tuckahoe Fish and Wildlife Management Area. In the 1800's the Bailey farm, like most farms, was a long narrow rectangle ranging from farmlands through wet woodlands to the waterways. A dirt road bisected the farm. Before the land was flooded out, this log road connected the dirt road to the salt hay meadows and to the dock from which produce was taken to the boatman's market in Atlantic City.

GREAT JOB! Ann Snyder has sent us this note:



The cooking fireplace in the farmhouse is now better equipped with cooking implements. We now




have a very much needed wrought iron long-handled shovel and a wonderful wrought iron toaster. Scott also provided assistance by re-working the bolts for our third rope bed and

showing us the proper method for roping it. Then he hand-crafted a bed wrench from oak wood which will be used to tighten the ropes.

The early 19th century bed is now set up on the second floor of the Gandy house.
