

Tuckahoe Railroad Station

Circa 1894



The Station was built in 1894. An addition and freight house along with a switch tower were built in 1906. Wilson Brothers of Philadelphia were the architects. The station is in the Queen Anne style with fish scale shingles and serpent back roof crest. It was placed on the National Register of Historic Places on June 22, 1984.

The coming of the railroad was an economic boon to the village of Tuckahoe since the glass factory in Marshallville had ceased operation. Aetna Furnace had closed, and the heyday of wooden sailing vessels was past. Tuckahoe was to evolve into a railroad town; the main junction from which the Atlantic City Railroad's trains from Camden fanned out to the Cape May County seashore communities.

Adjacent to the station is the old canning factory now restored as a banquet hall. Nearby are the Marshallville and South Tuckahoe Historic Districts.

In the summer of 1915, 22 trains passed the station on a daily basis. By 1982 all train traffic through Tuckahoe ceased, except for freights carrying fuel to the Beesley's Point generating station.

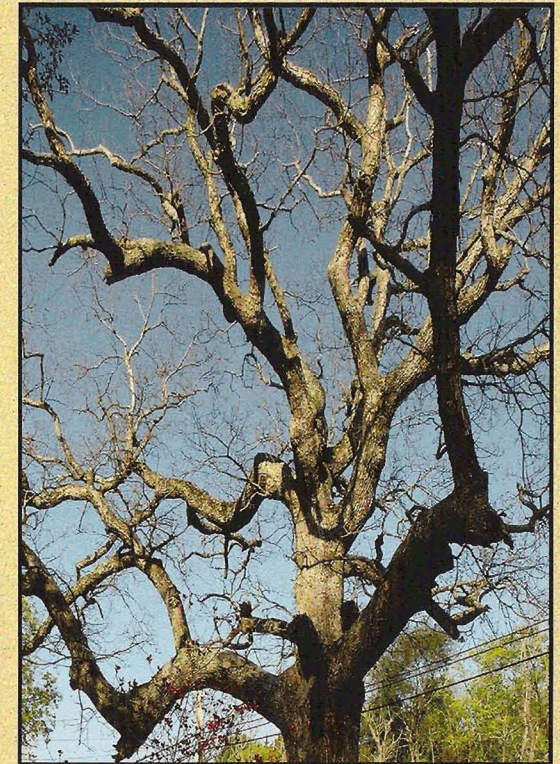

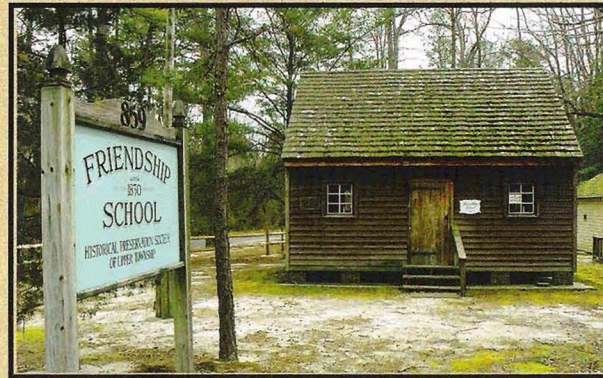

Friendship School

Friendship School was given to the Upper Township Bicentennial Committee in 1976 by William Wells, grandson of Enoch Clouting. Dismantled fragments of the building were moved from the Clouting property in Palermo to its present site on Upper Township owned land. Curtis Corson Sr. & his wife, Betty, chaired the project.

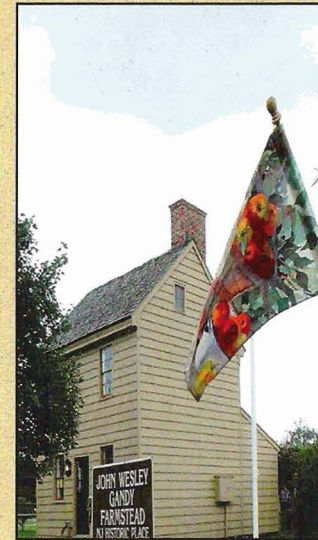
In 1980, the reconstruction was taken on by volunteer members and friends of the Historical Preservation Society of Upper Township. The school was dedicated on September 10, 1983.

The first official record of the school to be found is dated May 30, 1831. It is believed to have been in use until about 1865, when it was replaced by a larger building.

Also to be seen at Friendship School is the Seaville School privy, c. 1900, donated to the Historical Preservation Society by the family of former Upper Township Mayor Frank A. Kruk, and a coal and storage shed, c. 1900, formerly located on the grounds of the Palermo Elementary School, and donated to the Friendship School complex by Mr. and Mrs. Wes Nickerson.

J.W. Gandy Farmstead

John Wesley Gandy, born in 1847, and his wife, Emma Lavinia Van Gilder, were both descendents from Cape May County pioneering families.

The house was built in 1815 by Joseph Falkinburge, as a tenant farmer house. From 1815 to 1950, this house sheltered, and the land supported generations of farmers, mariners, shipbuilders, weavers, preachers & public office holders.

John Wesley Gandy was a farmer, minister, constable and district superintendent of schools and was a manager of the Cedar Swamp Meadow Company.

The Gandy Family has a proud heritage in the settling of Cape May County, and in 1996, the heirs of Winifred Gandy donated the house, and one acre of land on which it stands to the Society that it may be preserved and named to honor the memory of The Gandy Family.

The Society has created a period house farmstead museum which includes a barn, root cellar, smoke house, woodshed, privy, ice house, well sweep, grape arbor and orchards. The Gandy House is listed on both the NJ State and the National Register of Historic Places.
