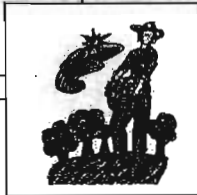

Rey Schmidt

Sadly, we have lost one of our most active and dependable members, Rey Schmidt. He was our treasurer for years, currently co-managed our website, and was on our Board of Trustees. He was instrumental in getting our latest book 'Upper Township Memories; A Residents' Historical Survey' published. Those of us who talked to him at the Strawberry Festival were shocked at the news of his passing. Rey never slowed down. He was always doing new things. He never got old. Below is a reprint of his obituary.

SCHMIDT, REYNOLDS D., 85 - of Seaville, passed away on Saturday, June 30, 2007 at his home. Born in Vining, MN, he was formerly of San Juan, Puerto Rico, and a resident of Seaville for 22 years. Mr. Schmidt had a 21 year career with the United States Air Force and was a Fighter Pilot in the Pacific Theater during World War II, and was a member of P-38 fighter group which brought down Yamamoto. From 1947 to 1949 he was stationed in Okinawa in the 623rd AC & W Squadron, and from 1950 until 1952, served in the Korean Conflict. He was on the last flight out of Seoul during invasion. He was a member of the 70th Air Squadron. He served on the DEW line in Alaska and Canada. His career with RCA took him to Thule, Greenland, Roosevelt Roads Navy Base, Puerto Rico, and he retired from RCA's Aegis project in Moorestown. Mr. Schmidt was a member of the Historical Preservation Society of Upper Township where he served as Treasurer and Web Master and was also a member of the Seaville Fire Police. Surviving are his wife, Maxine Schmidt (nee Willingham) of Seaville; a daughter, Daleyne Esteban of Seaville; two grandchildren, Alyssa Esteban-Cox and her husband James of Seaville, Daleyne Garlock and her husband Brad of Miami, FL; one great grandson, Dylan Garlock; a nephew Norman Neilsen and his wife Diane of Cilver, MO; grand niece Andrea Neilsen of San Diego, CA; grand nephew Ryan Neilsen and 15 nieces and nephews. His Funeral Service will be offered Thursday morning at 11 o'clock from The Godfrey Funeral Home of Palermo, 644 South Shore Road, Palermo, where friends may call from ten o'clock until the time of service. Burial will follow in Seaville Methodist Cemetery, Seaville. Architectural Committee Report:

CARRIAGE: The upholster has covered the roof and visors with a heavy black canvas and is working on the seats in his shop.

WINDMILL: After some delay and expense, we obtained state and county permits for a driven well at the windmill base. Geof Carr, with rope and pulley, and with ¼ inch per each weight drop, found water at 15 feet. After installing some appropriate plumbing, and restoring the horse trough, we're set up to demonstrate this method of providing water on a farm.

GANDY ORCHARD: Marj Bixby and I picked peaches which she will make into peach jam. She will also make jam from the Gandy grapes, both to be sold at the Apple Fest. The apples and pears are looking good.

TUCKAHOE RAILROAD STATION:

Sonia, Dan, Doug and Buzz Burnley open and host the station for the continuing Saturday train activity. On Friday 8/10, Tony Macrie and others arranged for a meeting of local, state and federal representatives to meet with DOT Director Richard Sarles to seek funding for track repair between Woodbine and Court House. I have reported the need for minor touch-up painting at the station to the township.

SPEEDER: After waiting 4 months, the rebuilt magneto has been received, and the re-built engine runs fine. Tom Douglass sent the transmission friction wheel to specialist for rebuilding. I'm hoping that Doug and Buzz will soon work out a location for housing the speeder with Twp. Engineer Dietrich and Tony Macrie. The township has budgeted \$3500.00 to build a shelter for the speeder, and if there is no progress on this project made this year, the money will have to be returned to the township.

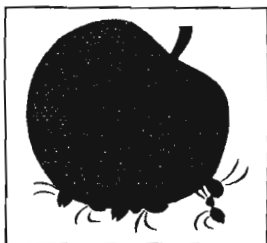

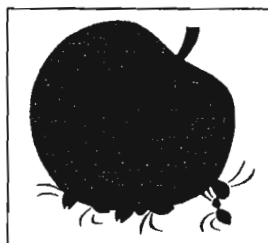
Calendar of Events

Calling All Members: AppleFest

If you can't help on the day of the AppleFest, we really could use your baking skills. Please help us out by volunteering to bake the following recipe. Our community loves home-baked goods *and this recipe is not only a crowd pleaser but also a wonderful contribution to our historical preservation society.* (We will be happy to supply the loaf pans. They will be available at our September 11th membership meeting.)

Yankee Magazine's Apple Bread

Yield: 3 loaves (36 slices)

4 cups peeled, cored, and diced apples (any variety)	¼ teaspoon ground allspice or ground cloves
1 cup white sugar	¼ teaspoon ground nutmeg
3 cups flour	¾ teaspoon ground cinnamon
2 teaspoons baking soda	½ cup vegetable oil
½ teaspoon salt	2 teaspoons vanilla extract
2 eggs, beaten	

- Preheat oven to 325 degrees F.

Grease three standard disposable 8-inch by 4-inch loaf pans

In a medium-size bowl, stir together the apples and sugar.

In a large mixing bowl, sift together the flour, baking soda, salt and spices. Add the apple mixture and stir well. Then add the oil, vanilla, and eggs and mix well.

Divide the batter between the three pans. Bake for 1 hour. Cool on a wire rack for about 10 minutes before turning out of the pans to continue cooling. To serve, slice one inch thick.

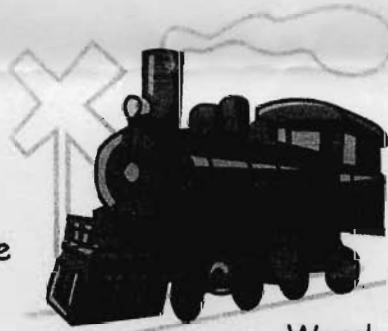
Did you know?
